



Executive Board Appoints Robert Corona as New IBEW 11 Business Manager

Former BM Joël Barton steps down effective immediately

obert Corona has taken the reins of IBEW Local 11 after Joël Barton submitted his resignation to the Local's Executive Board in a Special Called Meeting on Thursday, December 14.

The board voted to appoint Corona to take control of the Local's day-to-day operations as Business Manager and Financial Secretary from Barton, who has served in those positions since his election in June 2018.

After the vote, Corona was immediately sworn in by Board Chairman John Harriel in a ceremony witnessed by IBEW International Representative Billy Powell.

Corona will lead the organization through elections in June 2024 when membership will vote on candidates to fill the position. He is only the third Business Manager to helm IBEW 11 in the 21st century and the first person of color to hold the position.

"I am humbled. I'm honored,"
Corona told members of IBEW
11's senior and clerical staff at
a luncheon the day after his
appointment. "I've had the privilege
to work under two different Business
Managers. And I've seen both styles


have elected to appoint Robert Corona as Business Manager and Financial Secretary for the remainder of my term.

block between Wilshire Avenue and Sixth Street and operates under a Project Labor Agreement are engines of economic stability and growth for IBEW members, both new and old.

Brett Moss, the Business Agent for the northern part of District 1, said that because the Opus Towers residential project isn't publicly funded, the contract offers the developers some flexibility to bring on a diverse array of workers with different skillsets and levels of experience.

One of those workers is apprentice Hakob Hakobyan, who goes by Jack on the job. Right out of college, he first went to work in a pharmacy, pushing pills and doing paperwork as a low-level employee.

"I hated it," said Hakobyan. "I didn't see myself going far. The stress and the workload at the pharmacy was crazy."

Then, earlier this year, a family friend in the construction industry suggested he apply to become a union electrician - a move he had been eyeing for several years. Hakobyan put in his two weeks' notice at his "boring" pharmaceutical office job and never looked back.

That family friend was Haik Turdjian, a general superintendent for Conti Electric, who was running work on the residential Opus condominium project. That's where Hakobyan ended up working in August as an apprentice.

"Ever since, it's been a smooth ride," Hakobyan said. "It's amazing. I work with four to five different journeymen. All of them came up with different people as they journeyed through their

apprenticeship, and they all have different skills to teach me."

never," he said.

The towers broke ground in April 2021 and started to climb toward the sky in May 2022. Turdjian, the general superintendent, said that more than 100,000 man hours have flowed into wiring up the towers' 428 units, two skydecks and associated amenities.

In addition to housing, Opus will also feature a dog park, fitness centers, a club room, co-working spaces, a game room, a private screening room, and an indoor golf range.

The two towers, one 14 stories and the other 22, have provided consistent work for more than 50 IBEW 11 electricians, Turdjian said.

Among those 50 electricians are nine CWs, or craft workers, who have entered the union and started to climb the ranks of IBEW 11 by wiring up and trimming parts of these towers.

Just a few years ago, Raul Espinoza Armenta worked in construction, hanging around Home Depot, hoping that work for the day would drive into the parking lot.

He applied to become a union electrician, but the beginning of the coronavirus pandemic delayed his entry, and he signed up for a two-year stint in the Army Reserve. Now, he balances his reserve duties with his job as an Inside Wireman Apprentice on the Koreatown towers project.

"It's interesting. It's a challenge for me, first of

all, because, I'm an ESL," said Espinoza Armenta. "I like the program, the way of the union. I like the benefits they have."

Espinoza Armenta put in more than 1,200 hours on the project, passed his apprenticeship exam, and moved up from the lowest level of CW.

"He was out here for eight months and proved his work ethic," said Moss, the District 1 Business Agent. "He showed up every day. The company saw that in him and sponsored him into the apprenticeship program."

New workers like Espinoza Armenta rely on practical knowledge they gain in the classroom, along with experience on the job site from veterans like Marco Molina, an Inside Journeyman Wireman who has been with IBEW Local 11 for almost 25 years.

"Working with the younger guys, and trying to show them what you've learned along the way is satisfying," Molino said. "You have to be very patient, which I didn't know how to do in the past. But now that I'm older, it feels good to hand over what I've learned. You know, I can't take it with me."

Now Molino is just a couple of years from a retirement that has been made possible by his work as a union electrician. It's also allowed him to buy a house, decent cars, and braces for his kids.

That's a success story, and that's what the union is all about.





IBEW 11 Women Find Fellowship in Nation's Capital

n the crisp early December air, chants filled the streets of Washington, D.C., as hundreds upon hundreds of women poured out of the Tradeswomen Build Nations Conference, the largest gathering of women from the trades in history.

Heads turned; horns honked. The marchers carried banners, chanted union slogans and held their phones high to capture this rare moment.

Danielle Lewis, a third-year inside wireman apprentice from IBEW 11, took in the scene as well as the feeling of being seen.

"A lot of times we go unseen in these kinds of roles," Lewis said. "We're just there to keep our heads down and work. So, getting the opportunity to raise your head and hold it high and say, 'Hey, I'm a woman in the union. I'm kicking ass.' It's kind of awesome."

Each year, North America's
Building Trades Unions, or NABTU,
hosts the Tradeswomen Build
Nations Conference. The event
began in 2002 as the Women Build
California conference and grew over
time to include the whole country,
said Diana Limon, IBEW 11's Director
of Women Recruitment and Support

This year was the biggest event ever with 4,000 women traveling from across the continent, including 40 members of IBEW Local 11.

"It's very difficult to describe the energy in the room among tradeswomen," Limon said. "It's electrifying. The camaraderie is like nothing else."

Lewis, the third-year apprentice, was named NABTU's Tradeswomen Heroes Award winner for September 2023 for her contributions to IBEW Local 11. She currently works on the Metro Purple Line Extension project, where she is the only woman on site.

"We tend to think this is it for us, and it's the same thing for everybody, but getting the opportunity to go to the Tradeswomen Build Nations Conference opened up my eyes," she said.

This is her second year attending the conference, and it's an extension of the fellowship she experiences working with committees within Local 11, like the Solidarity Committee for female members and the Reaching out to Next-Gen Electrical Workers, or RENEW, committee.

In Washington, D.C., the IBEW members toured the International's headquarters and had the chance to meet International President Kenneth Cooper and Secretary-Treasurer Paul Nobles. Former House Speaker Nancy Pelosi addressed the plenary and visited

the Tradeswomen leaders in a small, private session and told attendees, "Don't agonize; organize."

The most important thing, she said, is ensuring that Democrats find success in 2024 elections to continue the policies of the most union friendly administration in history.

"You feel optimistic. You feel energized, and it kind of makes you ready to face the rest of the year, Lewis said. "You fill your cup up again at this conference and then go back into the world."

Taylor Kourkos, a Sound and Communications Journeyman, also attended the conference for the second time and said the event was "life changing."

Kourkos took up being an electrician after her father, who was also an IBEW member, and then dove into a world dominated my males.

"I'm a girl's girl," Kourkos said. "I was always the only girl on the job, and it was really rough. I didn't have anyone to talk to because none of my girlfriends were electricians."

Kourkos found female mentors

within IBEW 11, but the national conference really opened up her world. At this year's conference, she was one of four attendees selected for a new program: Connect to Success: Sister-to-Sister Mentorship. In this program, she's paired with a female electrician with decades of experience, a permanent connection back to the NABTU conference.

"The energy was insane, and I learned so much about how the union has changed for women over the years and how it has become a better place and a safer space," Kourkos said.

Usually, she would be nervous to be selected for a breakout group with a small number of influential electricians, but there in DC, she felt calm and inspired.

According to the department, exam applications are processed within 30 days, and it takes 24 hours for this info to transmit to our testing vendor, PSI. After that, exams are scheduled, and the onus is on the applicants. If you receive notification that you can schedule your exam and it is not available in PSI within a week, please contact me.

Barton succeeded Business Manager Marvin Kropke in 2018.

Barton came out of retirement to lead the Local through the throes of an international pandemic. In 2018, after his election, Barton appointed Corona as his deputy and Corona has served in that capacity as Senior Assistant Business Manager and Director of Organizing throughout Barton's tenure.

"It's been one heck of a roll," Barton said. "I couldn't have turned the Local over to a better person. Robert Corona is going to do a great job. I've known him a long time. 20 years ago, he was my boss. Then it worked out that I was his boss. And now he's my boss again."

The move had been under discussion for many months and Barton decided that now was the time to do it.

John Harriel, the chairman of IBEW 11's Executive Board, supports the changing of the guard. He has known and worked with Corona for many years and has great respect for his leadership ability.

Harriel met Corona in the very first days of his apprenticeship, when Corona taught him as a firstyear instructor in a class that also included Corona's brother Luis.

Robert Corona joined IBEW Local 11 in 1991 after serving four years in the Air Force and working for two years as a shop steward in the refineries before he applied for the apprenticeship as an Inside Wireman electrician. He moved into his role as an Organizer with IBEW 11 in 1998.



"In my 32 years of service and membership, I have performed in many roles and capacities," Corona said. "I am humbled and honored to take on this new duty and responsibility and will do so with all the moral earnestness and passion that you, the membership, deserve."

Fourteen IBEW electricians and EWMC members met downtown for the EWMC Day of Service and tended to a long line of hundreds of the unhoused and underprivileged. They passed out clothes donated by IBEW 11 members, personal hygiene kits and toilet paper.
